Breakout 1 9:15-10:45

Five Key Changes that Made My Students Readers

Talk in the Math Classroom

Effective math classrooms provide multiple opportunities for students to engage in meaningful math talk. Join this session to learn about and practice a variety of ways to build math talk into your classrooms.

Unlocking Student Achievement Through Assessment

Explore strategies and tools to design responsive assessments that encourage student ownership of learning. We will engage in ways to promote creativity and collaboration through choice and voice, conversations, observations, and products.

Teaching Practices to Strengthen Student Skills

This session will include practical strategies for weaving inquiry and skill development strands (e.g. Strand A) throughout your courses. Providing multiple opportunities for students to hone their skills in an integrated way develops deeper connections across the curriculum. Teachers will breakout by subject groupings to explore how this applies to their own curriculum.

Breakout 2 12:10-1:40

How to use Psychological-Education Assessments to Write Effective IEPs

A psychological-educational assessment involves a standardized assessment of a child's intellectual (aptitude) and academic abilities (achievement). It contains a wealth of knowledge to help understand how a child learns, and identify if and how they're struggling. The results can help educators understand a child's potential and provide recommendations and strategies to support their learning. In this session we will focus on using the strengths and needs identified in psychological-educational assessments to develop meaningful individualized educational programs (IEPs) where a child can progress and succeed.

Specialized Programs: The Role of the Homeroom Classroom Teacher

In ADSB, we offer specialized programs utilizing a withdrawal model in addition to our self-contained special education classrooms. This workshop will review profiles of our specialized programs/classrooms, who qualifies for placement, and where they are located. As well, this session will provide insight into the role of the homeroom classroom teacher in providing programming for students that access a specialized program at the school in addition to the homeroom classroom. Ideas and strategies for replicating a specialized program (even if your school doesn't have one) will be provided.

Differentiation for Diversity

In this workshop, participants will learn more about cognitive processes that are often tasked in our learning environments and will participate in hands-on activities that will help them better understand how to differentiate lessons to be accessible for all learners.

Breakout 1 9:00-10:30

Welcoming Multilingual Language Learners (MLLs) to Our Schools and Classrooms

This session will explore practical strategies to create spaces in which students' linguistic diversity and cultural identities are reflected in the learning environment. In addition, practical strategies to incorporate language learning into all subject areas will be explored.

Intended Audience: K-12 Teachers

Preparing Kids for the Jobs of Tomorrow

This session will provide an overview of Experiential Learning programs and opportunities that are available to secondary students (ie. SHSM, OYAP, Coop, Dual Credit, etc.). Join us to explore a variety of interactive tools and resources available to all teachers in support of student engagement. Explore how we can use them to leverage design thinking and pathway planning (ie. Skills Ontario, OCTE Kits, Virtual Reality, myBlueprint, EdgeFactor, etc.).

Intended Audience: Grade 7–12 Teachers

Courageous Conversations in the Classroom

In this session, participants will discuss methods to build our confidence and capacity to tackle difficult topics with our students. We will look at the ways in which our own experiences and biases affect our perspectives, techniques for establishing safe spaces for courageous conversations, examples of capitalizing on teachable moments, as well as how to address unexpected situations in the classroom.

Intended Audience: K-12 Teachers

Project-Based Learning with a Purposeful Integration of Technology - Developing Solutions for Global/Local Initiatives

This session will focus on how technology can be used as a purposeful learning tool throughout the inquiry process while engaging in project-based learning opportunities. We will look at a sample inquiry project that can be relevant for teachers of various grade levels and discuss numerous examples of how technology can be leveraged to amplify student learning. Be prepared to challenge and be challenged, as the goal of this session is to inspire you, while at the same time leave you with more questions than answers!

Shingwauk Residential School Truth Walk - Note: Double Session/Off-Site (9:00-12:00))

Join Alyssa Traves (Indigenous Education Lead) and Guests from the Shingwauk Residential School Centre on a Truth Walk at Shingwauk Residential School (1520 Queen Street East, SSM). Within this experience, guests will get a deepened understanding of the lasting impacts of Canada's residential school system. This learning opportunity is a two-part session offsite, scheduled from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. **Intended Audience:** K-12 Teachers

Breakout 2 10:45-12:15

Welcoming Multilingual Language Learners (MLLs) to Our Schools and Classrooms

An Introduction to Anti-Bias and Anti-Racist Work in the Classroom

This session is an introduction to anti-racist and anti-bias work in the classroom. We will deepen our understanding of how our personal identities shape our experiences and our understanding of our learners, and how we can make the shift from deficit-based to asset-based thinking. We will also learn and review basic language and vocabulary to guide us in our equity focused work. We will discuss moving from theory to practice in our anti-bias and anti-racist work in our classrooms by "spending our privilege" – including disrupting and interrupting inequities in our school environments. We will explore ways to cultivate inclusive classroom environments and will explore stereotypes that persevere in education.
